Tree	Leaf	Fruit	Bark
<p>Oak This tree is popular with squirrels because of the acorns it produces in autumn</p>			
<p>Sycamore This tree is famous for its helicopter seeds that spiral their way down</p>			
<p>Hazel This tree has lots of trunks coming out from the ground.</p>			
<p>Poplar This tree can grow really tall. The wood makes excellent matches</p>			
<p>Hawthorn This tree has thorns to protect it from animals that like might to eat it</p>			
<p>Ash Ash grows very fast. You can recognise ash by its black buds</p>

<p>Lime This tree has yellow flowers in spring which bees love</p>			
<p>Rowan This tree provides berries for birds to eat in autumn</p>			
<p>Birch When a new woodland starts birch is the first to arrive</p>			
<p>Horse chestnut This tree has leaves like giant green hands</p>			
<p>Cherry Not all cherry trees have berries but all have beautiful blossom in spring</p>			
<p>Hornbeam The trunk of this tree gives very strong wood which can be used to make pianos</p>
