



Each area is scored between 0 and 6b, where 0 indicates a very poor access to public transport and 6b indicates excellent access.

# LIFE EXPECTANCY AT BIRTH



The male life expectancy at birth is 80.3 years, which is similar to the Merton average of 80.7 years.



The female life expectancy at birth is 84 years, which is similar than the Merton average of 84.2 years.

# **HEALTHY LIFE EXPECTANCY AT BIRTH**



The male healthy life expectancy at birth is 64.5 years, which is lower than the Merton average of 65.4 years.



The female healthy life expectancy at birth is 67.7 years, which is higher than the Merton average of 66.3 years.


